and go slumping off into the sea.

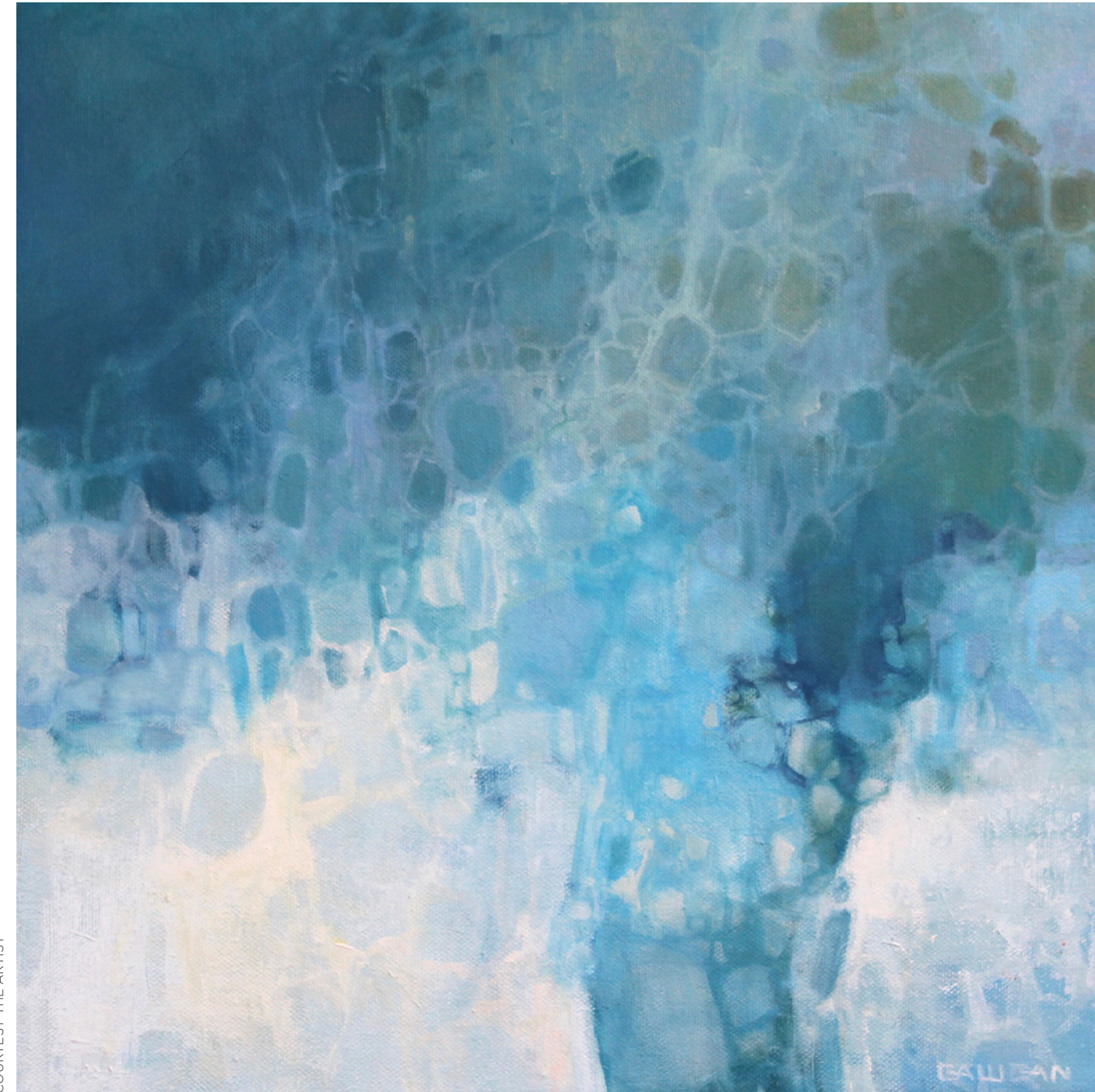
This old tree
